Whenever a BLM Mustang or Burro is put up for auction, the group purchases the animal, brings them back to the ISPMB facility, rehabilitates the animal and finds an adoptive and/or permanent home. These animals are also used to rehabilitate young and old people alike through the ISPMB Volunteer program. They are a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. The Sorraia Mustang Studbook (SMS) has been established to record available data of all Sorraia-type mustangs (dun/grullo), keep track of the horses, and encourage selective breeding for this type, as a means to help preserve the subspecies. The SMS does not rival any other mustang registry and does register horses strictly on conformation, regardless of the herd management area they were captured in or other mustang association(s) that they may also be registered with.

At this point free registration is available and consists of data-recording only; no papers issued. Issuing of registration certificates optional at \$25.00 per horse. If you are a mustang owner and feel your horse(s) may qualify, please write to the SMS, sending in the following: 5 color photographs, front view, side view, headshot directly from one side, dorsal stripe, BLM number or number of Mustang registry if the horse does not have a BLM number; sex, birthdate, height, name and address of owner.
